

FSMA Food Traceability Rule Traceability Lot Code Examples

Shipping Invoice Example

This is an example of an invoice that could be used to record and share all of the Key Data Elements (KDEs) that the Food Traceability Rule requires for the Critical Tracking Event of Shipping (§ 1.1340). The fields on this document that could be used to record the required Shipping KDEs are identified by numbers. The key to those numbers is shown below the invoice. You should refer to the rule for the exact information that is required.

For example, this document indicates that the "Ship to" field could be used to meet the <u>requirement</u> to maintain and provide the location description for the immediate subsequent recipient (other than a transporter) of the food. If you choose to meet this requirement in the "Ship to" field of an invoice, the field would have to contain all of the <u>required</u> information for this KDE, i.e., the business name, phone number, physical location address (or geographic coordinates), and city, State, and zip code for domestic locations (and comparable information for foreign locations) for the location to which the food is being shipped. Including the traceability lot code (TLC) on the invoice would be one way to link the TLC to the other required KDEs.

While this example contains space for all of the required Shipping KDEs for the purposes of illustration, 21 CFR 1.1455(g) states that you do not have to keep all of the information required by the rule in a single set of records. Your traceability plan must indicate the format and location of the records you are required to keep under the rule, in accordance with § 1.1315(a)(1). In keeping with a typical invoice, this example also includes space for information that is not required by the Food Traceability Rule.

Bill of Lading Example #1
