## Dear Tribal Leader:

The U.S. Food and Drug Administration's (FDA or the Agency) Center for Tobacco Products regulates the manufacturing, marketing, and distribution of commercial tobacco products, including cigarettes, smokeless tobacco, e-cigarettes, and cigars, to protect Americans from tobacco-related disease and death. FDA uses multiple tools, including compliance check inspections of tobacco retailers and tobacco-related educational materials, to help protect youth from the dangers of commercial tobacco.

We recognize and appreciate the efforts Tribal Nations and health officials have actively taken to reduce commercial tobacco use in your communities, especially among tribal youth. FDA respects tribal sovereignty and honors the nation-to-nation relationship it has with federally recognized American Indian and Alaska Native (AI/AN) tribes. FDA does not regulate the use of traditional (ceremonial) tobacco, and the Agency understands and respects the use of traditional tobacco by AI/AN tribes.

As part of our ongoing efforts to comprehensively regulate tobacco products, the Agency contracts with states, U.S. territories, and AI/AN tribes to conduct compliance check inspections of tobacco retailers to determine retailer compliance. FDA has a goal of establishing a contract, where feasible, with AI/AN tribes to conduct retail inspections within their jurisdictions. Currently, FDA utilizes its own inspectors to conduct retailer inspections on AI/AN lands where FDA does not have contracts.

We encourage federally recognized AI/AN tribes and tribal health officials to partner with FDA to conduct the abovementioned compliance check inspections. This partnership, strengthened by the intimate knowledge that Tribal Nations have about their lands and resources, will ensure that these inspections are conducted in a manner that continues to respect and support tribal sovereignty. By working together, we can promote healthier lives and communities.
